Started for Cumberland  
No. 2 arrived there the 26.

Dec. 12 / 62,

Left Cumberland for  
North Mountain arrived  
there on the 13.

Left North Mountain on  
the on the 22. and arrived  
at Martinsburg on the  
same evening.

March 22 / 63

went to Blockade  
the river.

Sunday April 26 / 63.

Left Martinsburg for  
Newrick arrived there  
the same evening.

Apr. 27. Left Newrick  
for Greenland gap  
22 miles. arrived there  
on the 28. Left there in

the afternoon for  
Camp Storm 8 miles  
Fair. there until Sunday

May 3. when we got  
orders for Newrick  
marched sixteen miles  
and got orders for

Greenland gap  
distance of 16 miles  
where we arrived a hour

Sundown



after marching  
30. or miles  
there we laid until  
day. we get orders  
for newerick  
where we arrived on  
the 4. and staid  
there until the 21  
when we got orders  
for Martinsburg  
and got here on 22.

June 14. 1863.

was attacked at Martins  
burg and in the evening  
was shelled like thunder  
retreated to Harpers ferry  
arrived there the morn  
of the 15.

June 16.

in line of Battle  
all day & the ten  
miles or more of  
very foolish but  
military we were  
in line of Battle  
about half the  
time while at the  
berry. July 1. 1863.  
Evacuated Harpers ferry  
went on Canal Boats  
to Washington City  
arrived at George town  
The morning of the  
forth staid there  
until monday  
morning when  
we marched

Through Washington  
saw the white house  
Capital & there we  
were carried for  
Fredrick City

July 7.

Arrived at Fredrick  
Marched six miles  
& camped in a corn  
field very muddy

July 8

marched 8 miles  
towards Gaithersmountain  
& camped July 9.

July 10. moved out  
one mile to Beons burrow  
valley we expect to  
fight the morrow

Sunday 11. marched  
out in line of Batt<sup>y</sup>  
and staid in sight

of the rebs all day  
but they did not  
fire. very heavy rain  
in the evening

July 12

we expected to fight  
to day certain but  
it didnt come.

July 14.

marched on the  
enemys works after  
they had all gone  
so there was no body  
hurt after all.

laid all night where  
the rebs had been  
& get as lousy as could  
be. July 15.

Started out a force



march after Lee, or  
to head him, crossed  
the river at Harpers  
perry, on the 17, after  
night mud well  
deep, July 18

marched towards  
snickers gap got  
within five miles  
of the gap July 19,  
marched ~~for~~ several  
miles and camped  
it being Sunday  
Monday, 20,

marched to Snickers  
gap & from there to  
upperville distance  
15 miles. there we  
staid until the 22.

July 22

Afternoon marched  
to Ashby's gap.

July 23.

Marched for Frontroyd  
or Manasses gap where  
we expect to have  
a fight our forces  
skermished with  
the rebs all afternoon  
we were in line of  
battle just behind  
the skermishers.

July 24 moon nothing  
done yet but soon  
found the rebs had  
gone and we could  
resume our old trail  
of marching on the  
retreat to head  
mount

July 25/63.

guarded a wagon train  
from Piedmont to  
Warrenton Sta.  
started at five in  
the evening & marched  
till mid night must  
necessarily

Monday Aug 17/63  
moved from Warrenton  
to Alexander where  
we camped until the 19.  
where we were ordered  
out a transport for  
New York by observing of  
the 20. we sailed for  
the Empire City

Aug 22. landed at the  
City & camped in  
Battles park

Aug 26. was spent  
in New York it being  
just one year since  
I left home.

Satur. Sept 5/63.

orders to march left  
the park & went down  
down laid on the  
wharf all night  
sabbath morning  
we were put on the  
boat "Wald Empire  
City" Sept 8.

Landed at Alexander  
all right. Sept 10.  
Sept Alexander for  
the Cape Fear River  
marched through  
Fairfax Bull run  
Battles ground &



Sept 14 Camp  
int the same camp  
we left when we  
went to New York.

Sept 16. orders to  
march to Culpeper.

Sept 19. Camp at  
Culpeper.

Sept 22.

Drawed eight days  
grubs. Oct. 8. 1863.  
Went on picket to stay  
three days.

Sunday 11.

The rebs relieved us  
from picket we fell  
back. Oct 12. in line  
at Battle all day.

Oct. 14 marched  
all day to Bull run.

Oct 17. went on  
picket along Bull run.  
Monday 19. started  
Back after Lee. arrived  
at Chatter ste on wens  
day 21. Oct 22. guarded  
Wagon train from  
Chatter to Bristol.

Lahveter Oct 25.  
went to Bealington ste  
to support Cavalry.

26 Cavalry skirmish  
ing in night all day.  
Went on picket at  
night 27. back in  
Camp. ~~to Bealington~~

Nov 7. left Bealington  
for the rapahannock  
got to the river at the  
place where the  
rebs skedaddled.

Lakbeth Nov. 21. 1863.  
was in sight of reefs  
most of the afternoon  
we run thence from  
Brandy Sta + Camp  
our selves.

Nov 26. 63  
Crossed The Rapids  
+ we crossed Dec. 2. 63

in duty for over a

guard in Cumberland  
and I was surprised to  
find so many sick  
soldiers there. There are

sick soldiers in

left for North Mountain  
Station on the 12 of Dec  
and arrived there on

April 26/63  
Left Martinsburg  
for New Brick.  
arrived there the  
same evening.

April 27/63  
left Newrick  
for some where  
across the country  
to ~~the~~ Green Mountain  
gap from there to  
Alegany mountains  
or Camp Storm  
So had general muster  
at Camp Storm

May 1. 1863  
stood picket on  
the <sup>Mountaintop</sup> Alegany <sup>by</sup> Stone  
river.



Sunday, May 3/68

Left camp storm  
for newerick and  
when we had mar-  
ched about thirteen  
miles we get orders  
to go back to green  
lies gap some fourteen  
miles get there about  
sundown. Tired and  
were out all night we  
marched the twenty  
two and thirty miles  
and then was only eight  
miles from where  
we left in the  
morning. Monday, 4.

Camped at green. The  
Gap or Whipperville  
Gap would be propp  
as they are very plenty

after night May 4/68  
~~at~~

May 5/68.  
Camped at Green  
Mountain. Rain hail  
day & night.

May 6/68  
Still at green the  
gap rain all day  
very muddy and disa-  
greeable. May 7, 1868

stood picket on the  
Petersburgh road. Station  
below the gap until  
three o'clock when we  
were relieved with  
marching orders for  
new Berick marched  
fifteen miles & camped  
for the night.

Thursday Nov 26  
Marched & crossed  
the Rapahan  
Nov. 27 had a hard  
fight our Brig was  
not engaged but  
was under fire for  
some time  
Sat 28, some fighting  
by 5 & 6 Corps.

Sabbath The 29  
Near Chambersville  
expect a big fight  
Monday 30. no fight  
yet. Dec. 1. 1863  
Beautiful morning  
& may fight to day  
no fight Tuesday 2  
Army retreated & crossed  
back ~~to~~ by  
Wednesday by or road

Thursday Dec. 3, 1863  
Marched from the  
river to our old  
camp Friday 4  
moved our camp to  
therebs huts.

Monday the 7. 1863  
at picket.  
Christmas was  
spent tolerably lively  
having received a  
Box the evening previ-  
ous. from Pophe.  
Newyears day  
was very middled  
had a big dinner  
from Lieut Col Jackson  
Box which was  
grand.
